In September, our members participated in the first Junior League of Northern Virginia (JLNV) 9/11 National Day of Service and Remembrance by making 140-bagged meals to support the clients of the Arlington Street People's Assistance Network (A-SPAN) and Cornerstones (formerly Reston Interfaith). Not only did our members participate, but the JLNV also collected donations from supporters as far away as Florida. The project was a great success for the Regional Community Impact Team, and I know they are looking forward to planning next year's Day of Service project.

Finally, one of the themes we are exploring this year is mentoring and developing it as a leadership competency. As the 12th annual *The Enchanted Forest* came to a close, JLNV 'elves' began planning for our *13th annual The Enchanted Forest* which will be in full holiday swing on November 23-24, 2013, at The Westin, Tysons Corner. This event provides an 'enchanting' weekend for the community with delightful premium events including Breakfast with Santa, Georgetown Cupcakes and Cocoa with the Snow Fairy Princess, Kids in the Kitchen, Children's

Science Center and National Capital Trackers. In addition, JLNV has secured new Main Stage performers, while popular favorites such as Pirate Magic, Ukulele Phil and the Hulu Kids, Adagio Ballet and the Maple School of Irish Dance will return to entertain our visitors. Perhaps most exciting for adults is the November 23 "Mistletoe Masquerade Ball" featuring an open bar, music by DJ Loud Tone, a live auction, passed hors d'ouevres and casino style gaming by Always Fun Casinos.

While The Enchanted Forest is a fun and thrilling event for both children and adults, it is ultimately a fundraiser. All proceeds from our premium and gala tickets directly support our community programs including



monthly educational enrichment programs in area homeless shelters, free school physicals and immunizations and backpacks for uninsured children. One of the highlights of The Enchanted Forest is the actual forest itself - a room of trees beautifully decorated with items for silent auction. There is a "Community Wreath" section that will directly benefit local area women's and children's shelters and other community partners. Like the silent auction for the trees, quests may bid on the wreaths in order to provide much needed





items to our community partners, such as feeding an entire homeless shelter Thanksgiving dinner or providing clothing and toys to families. As a token of our gratitude, the guest with the winning bid will be able to take the wreath home and display their support for the League. We are excited that the Forest will showcase "Community Wreaths" to remind ourselves what TEF is ultimately for – serving the community.

KIDS CAN COMMUNITY PROGRAMMING INSPIRES GOAL SETTING

The JLNV is committed to helping prepare children in Northern Virginia for success through programs such as Kids Can. Launched in the 2007-2008 League year, the main objectives of Kids Can are to build character and promote a high standard of ethics as supported by the Virginia Standards of Learning. This monthly program uses reading, discussions and crafts to explore characterrelated themes that are essential to healthy self-esteem for kids.

September brought students back to the classroom and brought Kids Can back to three Northern Virginia shelters: Arlington-Alexandria Coalition for the Homeless, Katherine K. Hanley Family Shelter, and Embry Rucker Community Shelter. With the start of a new school year, the September programming focused on helping students in the shelters set personal goals. To motivate the children, League volunteers began by reading aloud *Oh, the Places You'll Go* by Dr. Seuss. Next, volunteers paired off with students to talk about their goals for the year. Some students focused on school-related goals such as getting straight A's for the year. Others had home-focused goals such as being nice to their siblings, cleaning their room and helping with dinner.

After defining their goals, the students talked with their League 'buddy' about the different ways they could work toward achieving their goals. Each student enjoyed the one-on-one time with League volunteers and left with a personalized chart and set of stickers to keep track of their goals and mark every day that they worked to achieve their goal. Paraphrasing Dr. Seuss, we hope the students felt that after this exercise they could 'steer themselves in any direction they choose.'

JLNV HONORS THE NATIONAL DAY OF SERVICE AND REMEMBRANCE



Since the first anniversary of the September 11 attacks, Americans have come together to support their communities. In 2002 President George W. Bush proclaimed September 11 as Patriot Day, calling upon all Americans to reflect upon the events of 9/11 and remember those lost each year. He highlighted the spirit of service by issuing a Call to Service and launching USA Freedom Corps, a national volunteer program. Six years later, in 2008, President Bush amended the Patriot Day Proclamation to include "volunteering" as an appropriate expression of remembrance on 9/11. In 2009, President Barack Obama signed the Edward M. Kennedy Serve America Act that for the first time authorized the formal recognition of September 11 as a National Day of Service and Remembrance. Finally in 2011, for the 10-year anniversary of 9/11, a record 33 million Americans, and many others from 165 nations, joined together to pay tribute by engaging in charitable service, making 9/11 the single largest day of charitable activity in United States history.





On Wednesday, September 11, 2013, JLNV members and their families came together to honor and remember those who rose in service after the September 11, 2001 attacks at the Pentagon, in New York City, and in Shanksville, PA. JLNV believes that bringing people together in service builds a permanent and positive legacy that rekindles the spirit of unity that existed immediately after 9/11. In honor of the September 11 National Day of Service and



Remembrance, JLNV provided 140-bagged meals to two area homeless shelters, the Arlington Street People's Assistance Network (A-SPAN) and Cornerstones (formerly Reston Interfaith) for their clients in Arlington and Reston. All items were donated, assembled, and delivered by JLNV members and their families. Susan Alger, Volunteer Manager at Cornerstones, said, "Thank you for the lunches and the extra supplies! Our food budget is one of the biggest line items we bear, so donations of these meals help us stretch our dollars to help more people.

"FALL" IN LOVE WITH OUR What can I bring? Cookbook

From Hearty Chili (page 110) to Tortilla-Black Bean Casserole (page 135) you're sure to get a warm feeling even though the temperature is dropping outside.

We'd suggest for starters that you welcome the changing season with our delicious **Pumpkin Bread** (page 156):

1/3 cup vegetable oil
1/3 cup applesauce
2-1/3 cups sugar
4 large eggs
1 (15-ounce) can pumpkin
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
2 teaspoons baking soda
1-1/2 teaspoons salt
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
3-1/3 cups flour, sifted
2/3 cup water



Beat first 3 ingredients at medium speed with an electric mixer until creamy; add eggs, 1 at a time, beating well after each addition. Stir in pumpkin. Add baking powder and next 4 ingredients, beating well. Add four in thirds, beating well after each addition. Add water, beating well.

Pour batter into 2 greased 4 x 8 inch loaf pans.

Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour (for smaller loaves bake 45 to 50 minute, for muffins bake 25 to 28 minutes, for miniature muffins bake 18 to 20 minutes).

Yields 2 (8 x 4 in loaves) or 12 muffins.
